What this book is

The Modern World Library exists because someone treated a two-year run of daily **source-index pages** – commentary bibliographies from **January 2024 through July 2026** – as a link archive, not a playlist. Segment headers in ALL-CAPS. Government documents beside legacy headlines beside court dockets. Read one page and you get a mood. Read the full indexed cycle as a ledger and you get a **production function** – headline, document, gap – until the pattern is undeniable and the personality is irrelevant.

Full audit metrics (page counts, URL totals, crawl dates) live in **Appendix D**. This omnibus leads with the **gap**, not the crawl.

The number that should change how you argue

Machine analysis of the full the receipts reveal a country the headlines under-report – not because every journalist is lying, but because **packaging and documentation run on different clocks**.

When you read titles alone, **election** framing dominates the feed’s personality war.
